AGLER DENIES IT IS BLACKMAILERS' WORK

Special Dispatch to "The Examiner." SAN FRANCISCO, February 16.—An attempt has been made to wreck the Southern Pacific train near Volta, where the city was wrecked last month. A log of iron spikes was placed on the railway between Los Angeles and Volta on February 14, and the Pacific and San Francisco trains were stopped at the station. The Southern Pacific train was running ahead of the one and running on special time.

The Southern Pacific officials here say that the obstruction was not intended for the city, and they do not think the men who attempted to blackmail the company have resumed operations. According to the statement of Superintendent Allen, the obstruction was placed on the track by a couple of Italian boys living in Los Angeles. They say reports from their detectives show that the boys had placed the obstruction on the rail nearer to the city than the one which was placed on the track. They say they had no other motive than the fun of seeing another train wreck.

Both Superintendent Allen and General Manager Knutson have denied during the past week of the trial similar to the one which was placed on the track. The Southern Pacific train was running ahead of the one and running on special time.

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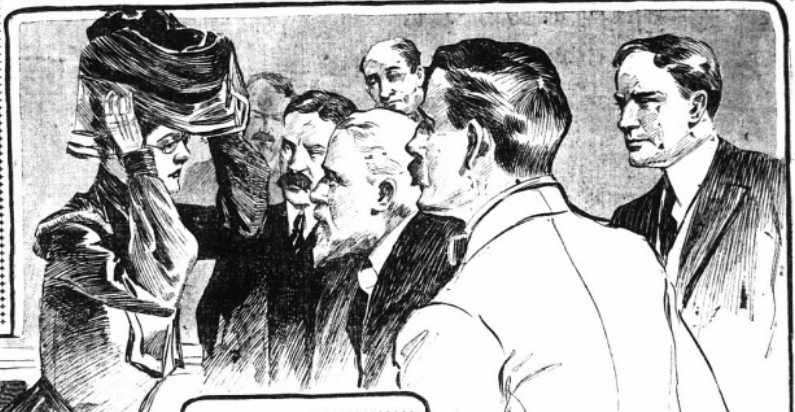
