## **Low-Context and High-Context Communication**

## Scenario 1: Both Friends Are From Culture A

- A1: "We're going to New Orleans this weekend."
- A2: "Sounds like fun! I wish we were going with you. How long are you going to be there?" [If she wants a ride, she will ask for one.]
- A1: "We're going for three days. By the way, we need a ride to the airport. Are you available to take us?"
- A2: "Sure. What time do you need to be there?"
- A1: "Our plane leaves at 3:00 this Saturday."
- A2: "No problem. I'll pick you up at noon."

## Scenario 2: Both Friends Are From Culture B

- B1: "We're going to New Orleans this weekend."
- B2: "I've never been there before, but it sounds like fun. How long will you stay there?"
- B1: "Three days." [I need a ride to the airport; I hope she'll offer me a ride.]
- B2: [She may need a ride to the airport.] "I am available this weekend and would be happy to see you off at the airport."
- B1: "Are you sure it's not too much trouble?"
- B2: "It's never too much trouble for a friend."

## Scenario 3: One Friend From Culture A, One Friend From Culture B

- B1: "We're going to New Orleans this weekend."
- A2: "Sounds like fun! I wish we were going with you. How long are you going to be there?" [If she wants a ride, she will ask for one.]
- B1: "Three days." [I need a ride to the airport; I hope she'll offer me a ride.]
- A2: [She must not need a ride since she didn't mention it]. "Have a great time! I'll see you when you get back."
- B1: [If she had been able to give me a ride, she would have offered it.] "See you then."
